

My Fellow American Guide for Hosting an Event

We're excited for you to host a My Fellow American event! We want this to be easy for you, and for you to be knowledgeable on the campaign and our mission. Below is a guide to get you started! Also, feel free to email outreach@upf.tv with any further questions.

About My Fellow American

My Fellow American is an online film and social media project that calls upon concerned Americans to pledge and spread a message that Muslims are our fellow Americans. It asks people of other backgrounds to pledge, and share a real life story about a Muslim friend, neighbor, or colleague that they admire. Using the power of social media, My Fellow American seeks to change the narrative – from Muslims as the other, to Muslims as our fellow Americans. Most Americans have never met an American Muslim.

Many only know Muslims through the way they are portrayed in the media. American Muslims are so often vilified as "the other" that it is possible not to recognize that most were born in the U.S., or that those who immigrated here came seeking the same freedoms and opportunities that have always attracted people to America.

Muslims are our fellow Americans, who today face threats to their civil rights and even their personal safety because of the fearful and often hateful rhetoric that would not be tolerated were it uttered about any other minority group.

Types of Dialogue Events

- Living Room Dialogue: A living room dialogue is a small gathering of people who join to watch a UPF film and discuss it. A living room dialogue typically takes place in a living room, but it can be held at a coffee shop, library, or other comfortable space. A living room dialogue must include at least five people, and the host must agree to pass out pre-dialogue and post-dialogue evaluation forms.
- Community Dialogue: A community dialogue is hosted by an

organization such as a university, a citizens group, or a religious group. The organization signs up to host the dialogue and hosts a presentation of the My Fellow American project. The 20,000 Dialogues team supports organizations that host community dialogues by providing customized train-the-trainer orientations as well as resources for publicizing the community dialogue.

For either type of event, you will have the resources to advertise, facilitate, and lead an effective dialogue.

Sample Schedule for Event

- 1. Short Intro
 - a. Welcome guests, start off with some icebreakers and ground rules
- 2. PowerPoint with My Fellow American (MFA) intros
 - a. Understanding the current climate towards American Muslims
 - b. Introduction to the My Fellow American project and campaign
- 3. Short explanation of the project, what it means to you, why you are hosting the event
- 4. "My Fellow American trailer" viewing
 - a. Gage the reactions to the film. After the viewing, assure guests that it can be difficult and emotional to watch. Confirm that the voices in the background are true, recent statements said in America.
- 5. "Who is Your Fellow American?" viewing
 - a. Excerpts from our collected video stories, presenting our campaign and a call to collect more video stories
- 6. Show examples of other's video stories
 - a. To use as a guide when presenting or collecting your own stories
- 7. Q&A
 - Answer any questions guests may have about the project, facilitate conversations about ways to help promote the campaign and reach a mainstream audience
- 8. Break up into groups
 - a. Film guests' stories about their fellow Americans
 - b. Network with other quests
 - Talk about ways to spread this message of hope and understanding, combating the negative images currently in the media

Estimated length of event: about an hour and a half, though allow at least two hours.



Four Steps to Running your Event

- 1. **Promote and Publicize** publicity, media, and social networking tools
- 2. **Prepare** to facilitate your event icebreakers, orientation and exercises
- 3. **Facilitate** the event use our discussion guides
- 4. **Evaluate** the event print out the pre and post evaluation forms for participants
